Official Common Prayer of the Church

- Required by clergy and religious
- Recommended for laity

§1174 - The mystery of Christ, his Incarnation and Passover, which we celebrate in the Eucharist especially at the Sunday assembly, permeates and transfigures the time of each day, through the celebration of the Liturgy of the Hours, "the divine office." This celebration, faithful to the apostolic exhortations to "pray constantly," is "so devised that the whole course of the day and night is made holy by the praise of God." In this "public prayer of the Church," the faithful (clergy, religious, and lay people) exercise the royal priesthood of the baptized. Celebrated in "the form approved" by the Church, the Liturgy of the Hours "is truly the voice of the Bride herself addressed to her Bridegroom. It is the very prayer which Christ himself together with his Body addresses to the Father.

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

What is Liturgy

- liturgy (*Greek*) = public work
 - liturgy = public worship



- The Mass and the Liturgy of the Hours have been significant parts of the Church's public worship for centuries
- The Liturgy of the Hours is an extension of the Eucharist in the Mass
- Prayed with others worldwide



Why?

- The Liturgy of the Hours (LOH) helps us to pray without ceasing so that our entire day/life is oriented to and focused on our relationship with God
- one's whole life is a prayer

Why?

- Jesus told the disciples the necessity to pray (Luke 18:1): Then he told them a parable of the Persistent Widow about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary.
- Paul reminds us to 'pray without ceasing' (I Thess 5:16-18)

Why?

- Those who are devoted to God have long prayed several times per day
 - Psalms 119:62, "At Midnight I rise to praise you"
 - Psalms 119:164, "Seven times per day I praise you because your judgments are righteous."
 - Daniel 6:11, Daniel defies the decree of his captors not to pray, and prays anyway





- Kabbalat Shabbat - the Receiving of Shabbat - is inaugurated with 6 psalms (Tehillim 95-100). The custom of welcoming Shabbat with festive psalms derives from an account given in the Talmud [Shabbat 119a] about the Amora'im, who would don their finest clothing on Friday to one another, "Come, let us go out to meet the

afternoon and say to one another, "Let us go out to meet the Shabbat Queen and receive her with festive ceremony." In the 16th century, the kabbalists in Tzefat observed this rite with great care; a group of them would join together and call



- The early Christians continued this pattern of praying throughout the day and night:
 - Acts 2:42, the early converts devoted themselves to daily prayer
 - Acts 3:1, Peter and John went to the Temple at 3P to pray
 - Acts 10:3, Cornelius prayed at 3P
 - Acts 10:9, Peter prayed at 12N
 - Acts 16:25, Imprisoned, Peter and Silas prayed at midnight

<u>The Apostolic Constitution (375 to 380 AD)</u> <u>Bk 7, Sec 34:</u>

At What Hours, and Why, We are to Pray.

Offer up your prayers in the morning, at the **third hour**, the **sixth**, the **ninth, the evening, and at cock-crowing:** in the **morning**, returning thanks that the Lord has sent you light, that He has brought you past the night, and brought on the day; at the third hour, because at that hour the Lord received the sentence of condemnation from Pilate; at the sixth, because at that hour He was crucified; at the <u>ninth</u>, because all things were in commotion at the crucifixion of the Lord, as trembling at the bold attempt of the impious Jews, and not bearing the injury offered to their Lord; in the **evening**, giving thanks that He has given you the night to rest from the daily labors; at cock-crowing, because that hour brings the good news of the coming on of the day for the the church or in a house, let every one by himself sing, and read, and pray, or two or three together. For "where two or three are gathered together in my name, there I am in the midst of them."







- One does NOT have to pray all the hours of the day to be in communion with the Church





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
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A Note:



Before we start...

- **Canticle** = a song or hymn (from Scripture)
 - Canticles also end with the LOH Doxology
- **Psalmody**= Group of Psalms OR Psalms + a canticle
 - A Psalm can be divided into 2 or 3 parts
 - Psalms and Canticles end with the Doxology
 - An Antiphon is said BEFORE and AFTER each Psalm or Canticle

Before

- Antiphon is a brief verse su Psalm and canticle.
 - The Antiphon offers an <u>a</u> Psalm or canticle
- Think of each Antiphon as the second s
 - A sandwich may have sev tomato, pickles, cheese, e



- But, there is a slice of bread at the top and at the bottom of the sandwich
- The Bread is the Antiphon

Psalm and Canticles:

 Antíphon Psalm • Glory to... Psalm prayer Antiphon





- Each Psalm and Canticle ends with the **Doxology**:
- Glory *(bow)* to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Sprit,
 - As it was in the Beginning, is now and will be forever. Amen.
- This is <u>NOT</u> the Rosary ending: "... is now and ever shall be, world without end."
- See p 679, top red <u>ALL PSALMS AND CANTICLES**</u>

For example, Week II, Evening Prayer, Friday, 2nd Psalm: p903

- **REMEMBER**: <u>*PRAY*</u> the LOH. Don't just read the prayers. Actually <u>*PRAY*</u> the LOH.
- Silence is sacred.
 - The Holy Spirit is most audible when we are silent and still
 - Observe a silent pause between the parts of the prayer to reflect

Before we start...

• A Hymn is at the beginning of every LOH Prayer.



- Hymns are liturgical, specifically selected for these prayers
- Music fosters unity of minds and invites us to actively participate
- Therefore: <u>NEVER EVER EVER SKIP THE HYMN</u>
 - Skipping the Hymn can be punishable for up to 2 <u>extra</u> years in Purgatory
 - You can: sing 'em, chant 'em, hum 'em, speak 'em.
 - Just Do 'EM!!

The Beginning of your Day

- We pray in response to God seeking to commune with us
- We can pray alone or in community
- BUT WE ARE ALWAYS PRAYING WITH THE MEMBERS OF OUR CHURCH AROUND THE WORLD
- We start with the **Invitatory**
- The **Invitatory** is prayed **once**
 - it is prayed before your first LOH prayer of the day



- Start with the Introduction
- Invitatory Antiphon
- Psalm 95 (or 24, 67, 100)
- Doxology (Glory to the...)
- Repeat the Invitatory Antiphon

- Start with the Introduction (p 647-649):
 - Cross lips as you start:
 - Lord + open my lips,
 - and my mouth will proclaim your praise



- Psalm 95 on page 648
- Psalm 95 will begin and end with the Antiphon
 - Option: say the Antiphon between the strophes (verses)
 - Seasonal Antiphonies on page 647
- After the last strophe, say the **Doxology**:
 - Glory to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, As it was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever. Amen.
- Close with the Antiphon



- Psalm 95
- It is a call to pray to the God of Creation
- Strophe 1 A call to sing and shout with joy to God, to sing him praises and thanksgiving
- strophe 2 tells you why you would praise him; tells you about this might God and why he is worthy of your praise



- Strophe 3 another call to come and pray, to submit ourselves to him for he cares for us
- Strophe 4 But, a warning. We are reminded of the stubbornness of the Israelites, how they were a faithless people although they had seen the power of God.
- Meribah and Massah Read Exodus 17:1-7



- Strophe 5 The faithlessness of the Israelites he had freed from Egypt hurt God and angered him. God wanted to commune with a holy people. Because of their faithlessness, that generation would not see the promised land.
- As we go about our day, we cannot be faithless. The Israelites of the first generation missed out on the Promised Land. We are cautioned not to miss out on our Promised Land: Heaven


