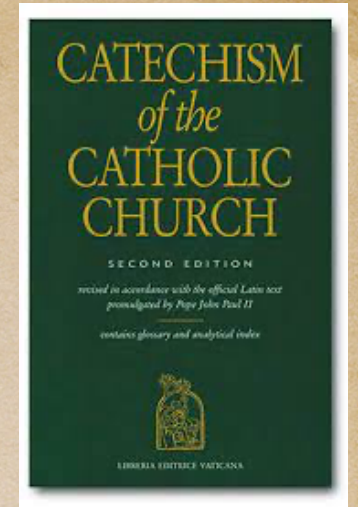
§1174 - The mystery of Christ, his Incarnation and Passover, which we celebrate in the Eucharist especially at the Sunday assembly, permeates and transfigures the time of each day, through the celebration of the Liturgy of the Hours, "the divine office." This celebration, faithful to the apostolic exhortations to "pray constantly," is "so devised that the whole course of the day and night is made holy by the praise of God." In this "public prayer of the Church," the faithful (clergy, religious, and lay people) exercise the royal priesthood of the baptized. Celebrated in "the form approved" by the Church, the Liturgy of the Hours "is truly the voice of the Bride herself addressed to her Bridegroom. It is the very prayer which Christ himself together with his Body addresses to the Father.

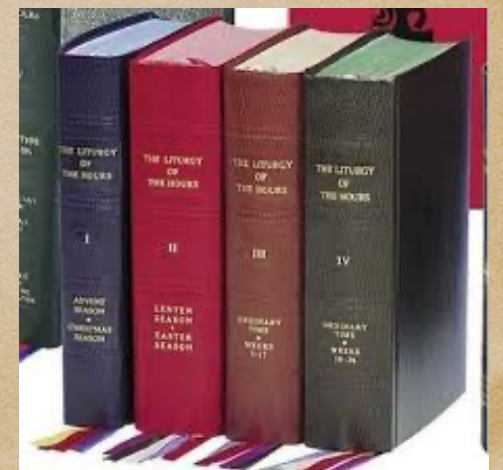


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What is Liturgy

- ♦ liturgy (*Greek*) = public work
 - ♦ liturgy = public worship
- ♦ The Mass and the Liturgy of the Hours have been significant parts of the Church's public worship for centuries
- ♦ The Liturgy of the Hours is an extension of the Eucharist in the Mass
- ♦ Prayed with others worldwide



Why?

- ◆ The Liturgy of the Hours (LOH) helps us to **pray without ceasing** so that **our entire day/life** is oriented to and focused on our relationship with God
- ◆ **one's whole life is a prayer**

Why?

- ◆ Jesus told the disciples the necessity to pray (Luke 18:1): Then he told them a parable of the Persistent Widow — about the necessity for them to pray always without becoming weary.
- ◆ Paul reminds us to ‘pray without ceasing’ (I Thess 5:16-18)

Why?

- ◆ Those who are devoted to God have long prayed several times per day
 - ◆ Psalms 119:62, “At Midnight I rise to praise you”
 - ◆ Psalms 119:164, “**Seven times** per day I praise you because your judgments are righteous.”
 - ◆ Daniel 6:11, Daniel defies the decree of his captors not to pray, and prays anyway

על-כל-אלהים – During the winter months, when the time between sheki'ah and tzet ha-kokhayim is shorter than in the summer, some communities from Northern Morocco have the custom of shortening Kabbalat Shabbat by skipping from here to Mizmor LeTodah.
תשמעו – Many congregations in Meknes only read Lekhu Neranena until here because the psalm reminds us of our ancestors' sins. They believed that a reminder of past failures was inappropriate during this time of favour when we approach the joyous moment of beginning Shabbat.

Why?

- ◆ The early Christians continued this pattern of praying throughout the day and night:
 - ◆ Acts 2:42, the early converts devoted themselves to daily prayer
 - ◆ Acts 3:1, Peter and John went to the Temple at 3P to pray
 - ◆ Acts 10:3, Cornelius prayed at 3P
 - ◆ Acts 10:9, Peter prayed at 12N
 - ◆ Acts 16:25, Imprisoned, Peter and Silas prayed at midnight

Why?

- ◆ *The Apostolic Constitution, OR The Holy Constitution of the Apostles*

- ◆ The Apostolic Constitution (375 to 380 AD)
Bk 7, Sec 34:

At What Hours, and Why, We are to Pray.

Offer up your prayers in the morning, at the **third hour**, the **sixth**, the **ninth**, the **evening**, and at **cock-crowing**: in the **morning**, returning thanks that the Lord has sent you light, that He has brought you past the night, and brought on the day; at the **third** hour, because at that hour the Lord received the sentence of condemnation from Pilate; at the **sixth**, because at that hour He was crucified; at the **ninth**, because all things were in commotion at the crucifixion of the Lord, as trembling at the bold attempt of the impious Jews, and not bearing the injury offered to their Lord; in the **evening**, giving thanks that He has given you the night to rest from the daily labors; at cock-crowing, because that hour brings the good news of the coming on of the day for the operations proper for the light.**If it be not possible to assemble either in the church or in a house, let every one by himself sing, and read, and pray, or two or three together. For "where two or three are gathered together in my name, there I am in the midst of them."**

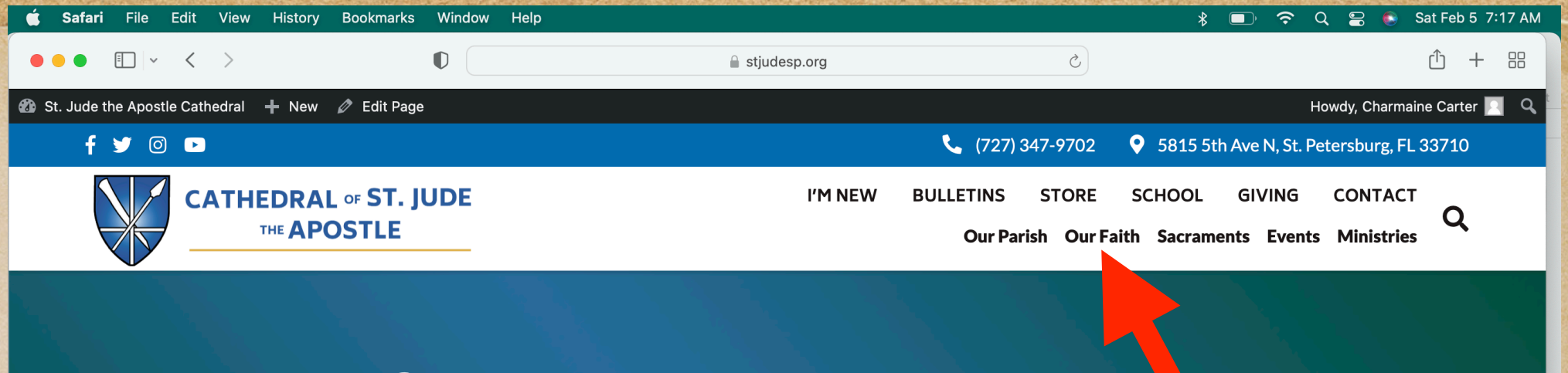
A Note:

- ◆ Each Psalm and Canticle ends with the **Doxology**:
Glory (*bow*) to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit,
As it was in the Beginning, is now and will be forever. Amen.
- ◆ **NOT** the Rosary ending: "...is now and ever shall be, world without end."
- ◆ SEE note on page 702 in **red** at bottom

Before we start...

- ♦ **Canticle** = a song or hymn (from Scripture)
- ♦ **Psalmody** = Group of Psalms — OR Psalms and a canticle
 - ♦ A Psalm can be divided into 2 or 3 parts
 - ♦ Psalms and Canticles end with the Doxology
 - ♦ An **Antiphon** is said BEFORE and AFTER each Psalm or Canticle

Before

- ◆ **Antiphon** is a brief verse such as a Psalm and canticle.
 - ◆ The Antiphon offers an an Psalm or canticle
- ◆ Think of each Antiphon as the bread of the sandwich
 - ◆ A sandwich may have several layers of fillings such as lettuce, tomato, pickles, cheese, etc.
 - ◆ But, there is a slice of bread at the top and at the bottom of the sandwich
 - ◆ The Bread is the Antiphon

Before we start...

- ◆ **REMEMBER:** PRAY the LOH. Don't just read the prayers. Actually PRAY the LOH.
- ◆ Silence is sacred.
 - ◆ The Holy Spirit is most audible when we are silent and still
 - ◆ Observe a silent pause between the parts of the prayer to reflect

Before we start...



- ◆ A Hymn is at the beginning of every LOH Prayer.
- ◆ Hymns are liturgical, specifically selected for these prayers
- ◆ Music fosters unity of minds and invites us to actively participate
- ◆ Therefore: **NEVER EVER EVER SKIP THE HYMN**
 - ◆ *Skipping the Hymn can be punishable for up to 2 extra years in Purgatory* 😂
 - ◆ *You can: sing 'em, chant 'em, hum 'em, speak 'em.*
 - ◆ *Just Do 'EM!!*

The Beginning of your Day

- ◆ We pray in response to God seeking to commune with us
- ◆ We can pray alone or in community
- ◆ — **BUT WE ARE ALWAYS PRAYING WITH THE MEMBERS OF OUR CHURCH AROUND THE WORLD**
- ◆ We start with the Invitatory (Top of p 686)
- ◆ The Invitatory is prayed **once**
 - ◆ it is prayed before *your* first LOH prayer of the day

- ◆ Start with the Introduction (Top of p 686):
 - ◆ Cross lips as you start:
 - ◆ Lord + open my lips,
 - ◆ - and my mouth will proclaim your praise

The Invitatory

- ♦ Psalm 95 on **page 688**
- ♦ Psalm 95 will begin and end with the **Antiphon**
 - ♦ Seasonal Antiphonies on page 686-687
 - ♦ Ordinary Time listed in the 4-week Psalter
 - ♦ Option: say the **Antiphon** between the **strophes** (verses)
- ♦ After the last strophe, say the **Doxology**:
 - ♦ Glory (**bow**) to the Father, and to the Son, and to the Holy Spirit, As it was in the beginning, is now, and will be forever. Amen. <*different from the Rosary*>
- ♦ Close with the **Antiphon**

The Invitatory

- ◆ Psalm 95
- ◆ It is a call to pray to the God of Creation
- ◆ Strophe 1 - A call to sing and shout with joy to God, to sing him praises and thanksgiving
- ◆ strophe 2 - tells you why you would praise him; tells you about this mighty God and why he is worthy of your praise

The Invitatory

- ◆ Strophe 3 - another call to come and pray, to submit ourselves to him for he cares for us
- ◆ Strophe 4 - But, a warning. We are reminded of the stubbornness of the Israelites, how they were a faithless people although they had seen the power of God.
- ◆ Meribah and Massah - Read Exodus 17:1-7

The Invitatory

- ♦ Strophe 5 - The faithlessness of the Israelites he had freed from Egypt hurt God and angered him. God wanted to commune with a holy people. Because of their faithlessness, that generation would not see the promised land.
- ♦ As we go about our day, we cannot be faithless. The Israelites of the first generation missed out on the Promised Land. We are cautioned not to miss out on our Promised Land: Heaven

Move to First Prayer of Day

- ◆ Go to First Prayer of *YOUR* day
 - ◆ Morning Prayer
 - ◆ Office of the Readings

HOMework

- ♦ Pray the **Invitatory** every morning before your morning offering
 - ♦ Use Antiphon: “Come, let us sing to the Lord, and shout with joy to the Rock who saves us.”
 - ♦ *We will learn the proper Antiphons next week*
 - ♦ Remember: ‘*Psalm sandwich*’
- ♦ Practice Doxology
- ♦ Read Exodus 17:1-7
- ♦ Meditate on Psalm 95 in light of Ex 17:1-7
- ♦ Watch Videos
- ♦ Start reading the GILH - slowly over time
- ♦ Get familiar with your CP book
