

 - ◆ **Black** = what is prayed (spoken, sung)

 - ◆ Various roles and actions
 - ◆ when to sit and stand
 - ◆ when and where to cross yourself

Catechism of the Catholic Church



§1176 - The celebration of the Liturgy of the Hours demands not only harmonizing the voice with the praying heart, but also a deeper "understanding of the liturgy and of the Bible, especially of the Psalms."

4-Week Psalter

- ♦ PAGE 699
- ♦ **The Psalter are at the heart of the LOH prayers**
- ♦ The prayers begin with a Hymn and a collection of Psalms (Psalmody)
- ♦ The Psalter provides the Hymns and the Psalms (and Antiphons) for the liturgical prayers
 - ♦ **NOTICE**: - The Doxology is not printed at the end of the Psalms and Canticles; you have to remember to pray it at the end of the Psalms (see P679, top)
- ♦ Invitatory, Office of Readings, Morning, Daytime, and Evening Prayers are on a 4 week rotation - **SEE p 699**
- ♦ Nighttime Prayer is on a 1 week rotation - starting p 1164

Catechism of the Catholic Church

§1177 - The **hymns and litanies** of the Liturgy of the Hours integrate the prayer of the psalms into the age of the Church, expressing the symbolism of the time of day, the liturgical season, or the feast being celebrated. Moreover, the reading from the Word of God at each Hour (with the subsequent responses or troparia) and readings from the Fathers and spiritual masters at certain Hours, reveal more deeply the meaning of the mystery being celebrated, assist in understanding the psalms, and prepare for silent prayer. the lectio divina, where the Word of God is so read and meditated that it becomes prayer, is thus rooted in the liturgical celebration.

4-Week Psalter



- ◆ Psalm = from Book of Psalms
- ◆ Canticle = song from Scripture
- ◆ Liturgical Hymns are at the beginning of each prayer
- ◆ NEVER SKIP THE HYMN
- ◆ GILH: Chapter V, Section II, §267 - 284
 - ◆ **NOTE: §270**
 - ◆ **NEVER SKIP THE HYMN!**

General Instructions of the LOH

- **270,** Singing in the Liturgy of the Hours is not to be regarded as something merely ornamental or extrinsic to prayer. It springs from the depths of the person praying and praising God, and fully and perfectly reveals the communal character of Christian worship. To be commended therefore are those Christian communities—whatever their character—which endeavor as often as possible to use this form of praying the Office. Clerics, religious and faithful should be given proper instruction and practice in the singing of the Office, so that especially on festive days they will be able to enjoy singing the Hours. However difficult it is to sing the whole Office, the praise of the Church is not to be considered either in its origins or of its nature as the preserve of clerics and monks; it belongs to the whole Christian community. Many principles are to be borne in mind if the singing of the Liturgy of the Hours is to be carried out correctly, and if its value and beauty are to be appreciated.

- 271 It is especially appropriate that singing should be used at least on Sundays and festive days. From this the various degrees of solemnity may be recognized.
- 272 Not all the Hours are of the same importance. Hence it is fitting that the singing of those Hours which form the two hinges of the Office, namely Lauds and Vespers, should be preferred and solemnized more than the others.

4-Week Psalter

- ◆ PAGE 675
- ◆ NOTE: Evening Prayer I, p677
- ◆ REMEMBER, *liturgically*, Sunday begins at *sundown* on Saturday.
 - ◆ Genesis 1
 - ◆ Therefore, the evening prayer prayed on Saturday evening is liturgically Sunday
 - ◆ Therefore it is called Evening Prayer 1
 - ◆ Evening Prayer prayed on Sunday Evening, then, is Evening Prayer II (for example, see page 694)

4-Week Psalter

Sundays/Solemnities

- ◆ Evening Prayer 1 (for Sundays)
- ◆ Invitatory - with Antiphon for Ps 95 (*or others*)
- ◆ Morning Prayer
- ◆ Evening Prayer (II for Sundays)

Weekdays

- ◆ Invitatory - with Antiphon for Ps 95 (*or others*)
- ◆ Morning Prayer
- ◆ Evening Prayer (II for Sundays)

4-Week Psalter

- ◆ 4-Week Rotation
- ◆ Week 1 - 4 of Advent and Christmas correspond directly
- ◆ Week 5 of Lent, Easter → start over with Week 1 of the Psalter
- ◆ Holy Week (Week 6 of Lent) and Week 6 of Easter → use Week 2 of the Psalter, etc
- ◆ Week 7 of Easter - use Week 3

4-Week Psalter

- ◆ Start over at a new Liturgical Season
- ◆ Except:
 - ◆ Ash Wednesday through Saturday - uses the Week 4 of the Psalter
 - ◆ Because the 1st Sunday of Lent uses Week 1 of the Psalter

4-Week Psalter

- ◆ When you start a prayer, ASK:
 - ◆ What is the liturgical week?
 - ◆ Which week Psalter is used?
 - ◆ Go to that Week and Day
 - ◆ ex, if it is Tuesday in the 13th week of OT,
 - ◆ then go to Week 1 of the Psalter
 - ◆ then go to Tuesday and start the prayer



- ◆ Instructions on page 653

Morning Prayer

♦ Pattern of Morning Prayer:

- ♦ Hymn
- ♦ Psalmody = Psalm, **Old Testament Canticle, Psalm**
- ♦ **GO TO PROPER OF SEASONS**
- ♦ Scriptural Reading
- ♦ Responsory
- ♦ Gospel Canticle - Zechariah (+), Benedictus
- ♦ Intercessions
- ♦ Our Father
- ♦ Concluding Prayer
- ♦ Dismissal - p657

Morning Prayer

- ◆ Start with the **Invitatory** (See lesson 2) **IF** Morning Prayer is the first prayer of your day
- ◆ Or - start with the Introduction if it is not your first prayer:
 - ◆ God + come to my assistance, Make haste to help me.

Morning Prayer

- ◆ Enter into Morning Prayer
- ◆ **NEVER** SKIP the Hymn
- ◆ Psalmody: Psalm, **Old** Testament Canticle, Psalm
 - ◆ Psalm = Antiphon, Psalm, (Psalm Prayer), Doxology, Antiphon
 - ◆ Short Pause after each Psalm and Canticle

Morning Prayer

- ♦ **NOTE:** If in Ordinary Time, Continue to use Readings - end from the 4 - Week Psalter
- ♦ IF **outside** of Ordinary Time —**ADVENT/CHRISTMAS**, you are to go to: **Proper of Seasons (starts p 119)**

- ♦ Find the liturgical day and week you are in
- ♦ Go to: Morning Prayer
 - ♦ Hymn
 - ♦ Psalmody



- ♦ **AFTER PSALMODY FOR LITURGICAL SEASONS OUTSIDE OF ORDINARY TIME, GO TO THE PROPER OF SEASONS**

Morning Prayer

- ◆ **Go to: Proper of Seasons** -p119 (hymns
 - ◆ starts with hymns for the liturgical hours
 - ◆ readings on p 137
- ◆ For Monday Week 1, p153
 - ◆ Scripture Reading
 - ◆ Responsory
 - ◆ Short Pause, silence, for reflection

Morning Prayer

- ◆ Gospel Canticle = Canticle of Zechariah (+), **STAND**
 - ◆ Antiphon for the Gospel Canticle
 - ◆ Canticle of Zechariah, p 655
 - ◆ Doxology
 - ◆ *repeat* Antiphon for the Gospel Canticle

- ◆ Read story of Zechariah and Elizabeth
 - ◆ Luke 1:5-25
 - ◆ Luke 1:57-80:

Morning Prayer

- ◆ Intercessions
- ◆ The Lord's Prayer
- ◆ Concluding Prayer
- ◆ Dismissal
 - ◆ May + the Lord bless us, protect us from all evil, and bring us to everlasting life. Amen.



 - ◆ *repeat* Advent Antiphon
- ◆ **Morning Prayer, 686**
 - ◆ *SKIP the Introduction (bc you prayed the Invitatory)*
 - ◆ Hymn, #122, OR option
 - ◆ Psalmody: Ps 63; Canticle of Daniel [note red]; Ps 149
- ◆ **THEN MOVE TO THE PROPER OF SEASONS FOR THE REST OF MORNING PRAYER - p144/5**
- ◆ Reading, Romans
- ◆ Responsory
- ◆ Antiphon for Canticle of Zechariah
- ◆ p 655, Canticle of Zechariah (+)
- ◆ *repeat* Antiphon for Cant of Zech
- ◆ Intercessions
- ◆ Our Father...
- ◆ Concluding prayer
- ◆ Dismissal (May the Lord bless us...) (p. 657)
